

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KENT WEEKS' THEBAN MAPPING PROJECT LIBRARY IS MUCH MORE THAN BOOKS

A VISIT TO THE TMP LIBRARY, FEBRUARY 9/2022 WEST BANK EGYPT

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Dr. Kent Weeks' new Theban Mapping Project (TMP) Library is perfectly situated in what seems like the most unlikely place. It is nestled between two thriving villages on the west bank of Luxor, down a dirt road past donkeys tied to fences and fields of fodder. A far cry from the former single-story building of unfired bricks with leakage issues. This new building, opened in 2020, is accessible to most of the ancient monuments. Its three storeys are mainly finished (really, is any building in Egypt ever finished?) and have been a long time in the works.

Why a new building? Well, aside from the water issues, the old building, about 850 sq. feet /79 sq. metres had a dingy tiny office with no space for computers and a compact (read really small) library, with no room inside to hold children's or adult's programs. In addition, there was no proper space for the TMP and no room for expansion of existing or future programs. Frankly, the old building had outlived its original purpose.

The new TMP Library, on the other hand, is a concrete building of about 3000 sq. ft/ 278 sq metres and has lots of room in which to grow. There is a large garden on the side of the building that can be used as a play area or an entertainment setting.

Outside the main door, on holidays and after school you'll see twenty or so pairs of children's shoes, kicked off as the youngsters head into the building. A room dedicated to teaching children is to the right as you enter. There, an Arabic language teacher supervises and engages group activities like colouring, assembling puzzles and watching National Geographic films primarily on ancient Egypt. It's well known that children learn best when they are active participants. Today, the class enthusiastically shows off some of their newly learned skills and with broad smiles lighting their faces, the children are rewarded with applause from the adults watching and their own sense of self satisfaction.

Kent Weeks says, "I am convinced that if we can teach these young residents on the West Bank how important it is to protect the monuments of Thebes we're going to wind up doing more in terms of site protection



than all the site management programs that have been devised that come to mind, even by us. We're talking maybe twenty years down the line. These children will be responsible for protecting the monuments in the future". The Library's children's program is especially important since the curriculum of local schools offers very little instruction in the history of ancient Egypt. The TMP Library attempts to fill that gap and in so doing encourages children to become stewards of the historic sites.

Across from the children's room is a spacious library with a broad collection of books on history, Egyptology, archeology, anatomy, and geology of the area in both English and Arabic. In a visit to the Library this past February, Dr. Kent Weeks, Emeritus Professor of Egyptology at the American University in Cairo and Founding Director of the Theban Mapping Project, explained the Library's two-fold goals:

1. to have a headquarters for the TMP where all the work and maps of the King's Valley, Queen's

- Valley and Thebes are available and
2. to provide a reference library with a focus on Thebes.

The library is open year-round to a variety of professionals and non-professionals: Egyptology colleagues, tour guides, and village people who live around the monuments and who directly or indirectly will be responsible for their protection. Books are selected that appeal to a wide range of people including students at the university and high school levels. The space provides a quiet, well-lit area for students to do their homework. "And maybe," Kent adds with a grin, "we can throw in a little Egyptology conservation at the same time."

This is truly where the TMP Library excels ... it is so much more than books.

In almost everything, from children to adults, there is an underlying theme of encouraging and promoting preservation of the ancient monuments through education and awareness. It is a multi-layered approach serving the needs of the community, while imparting a sense of how the history of the past, often temples and excavation sites walked by daily, has a place in the future. Strengthening one's own feeling of cultural

identity is a step in the direction of protecting the antiquities of the region.

In the same vein, Kent hopes that medical and veterinary students with little access to medical books will make use of the library and perhaps, in the process, will end up working on mummified skeletal remains. Modest practices like this, grow into daily habits that can impact the future.

And it doesn't stop there. The TMP Library is serving a vital need empowering local women.

At their own request, village women are taking computer lessons in the Library taught by other women. And not only that, more than a dozen women asked to learn how to read and write in Arabic. This is encouraging since over the past 10-15 years, Kent has seen a dramatic drop in literacy, especially among women, possibly due to economic reasons. For instance, if a family has limited resources when it comes time to start school, the family may decide to educate the boys and have the daughters stay at home where they are deemed more productive by taking on an additional share of the household responsibility until they marry, often early.

In addition to empowerment, providing access to further education for these women has resulted in yet another positive outcome. Often, they come back to the Library, and, among other things, are reading books on conservation and Egyptology. It's a ripple effect of encouraging local people to care about and foster an active appreciation of their heritage.

Kent is brimming with future plans which include: completing a dedicated space for the TMP and colleagues on the 2nd floor; as well as, purchasing additional computers, academic and children's books, activities, films and posters and building more work

space and a small apartment on the roof for visiting scholars. These improvements cost money. Kent depends on the generosity of the public. You, too, can be a part of this vision. If you love Egypt and want to support the programs at the TMP Library, it's easy.


Montreal celebrates 200 years of Egyptology in June !

The University of Quebec in Montreal (UQAM) is pleased to announce its international symposium '**Golden Years 1822•1922•2022**' — Montreal celebrates 200 years of Egyptology, which will be held at UQAM (Montreal) on **June 17-18-19, 2022**.

'**Golden Years**' is a hybrid event, which allows for both in-person and Zoom attendance. It gathers a panel of specialists around two major discoveries in Egyptology: the decipherment of the hieroglyphs by Jean-François Champollion in 1822, and the discovery of the tomb of Tutankhamun by Howard Carter in 1922.

To celebrate the bicentenary and centenary of these breakthroughs, scholars will present their latest researches on the topic, and the archives connected to these discoveries held in their institutions.

'**Golden Years**' is also a multi-format event, encompassing lectures, poster sessions, a panel discussion, a lecture-





The Society for the Study of Egyptian Antiquities/Société pour l'Étude de l'Égypte Ancienne invites all doctoral level graduate students and senior scholars to submit proposals for papers to be given at this year's Scholars' Colloquium, to be held on NOVEMBER 4th and 6th, 2022 in Toronto. The deadline for submission is August 31st, 2022. Papers will be hybrid, delivered both In Person and Live via Zoom. Please indicate whether you will be present in person.

Proposals for Scholars' Colloquium papers will be accepted in the fields of Egyptology, Anthropology, Classics, Fine Arts, Archaeology, Nubian Studies and related fields on ANY topic connected with pre-dynastic, pharaonic, Hellenistic, Roman or Coptic Egypt, but must represent an original contribution to the field. Presentations may be given in either English or French. Papers may not exceed 20 minutes in length.

Since a limited number of proposals will be accepted, papers will be vetted by committee. Interested scholars should send a title and brief abstract of their proposed paper to the Scholars' Colloquium Coordinators at scholarscolloquium@thessea.org or sseacolloquium@gmail.com. Please note that only proposals submitted in electronic format [i.e. via email] will be considered. Abstracts must not exceed 350 words in length.

The SSEA/SÉEA is also holding its 46th Annual Symposium on NOVEMBER 5th. The Colloquium is held in conjunction with the November 6 Symposium. The topic for this year's Symposium is Digging Into Egyptology's Past and Present. It will also be held in hybrid form, both In Person and live via Zoom. More information about the program for the weekend will be forthcoming.

We look forward to receiving abstracts from scholars from around the world, and invite your submission with eager anticipation. This will be a memorable colloquium. Papers accepted for the Scholars' Colloquium are not limited to the topic of the Symposium, and no preference will be given to proposals based on topic. Please also note that the SSEA is soliciting proposals for the Scholars' Colloquium only. All participants in the Scholars' Colloquium will be expected to pay the appropriate registration fee in advance.

This year the Sally L. D. Katary Travel Scholarship is available to Student Members of the SSEA. This award is available to aid scholars wishing to travel to Toronto to present at the 2022 SSEA Scholars' Colloquium. The intent of the award is to aid scholars who would not otherwise have funding to travel to the event. The selected individual will have their registration paid, along with \$300 to defray costs associated with traveling to Toronto to present. CALL FOR "VIRTUAL" POSTERS SSEA/SÉEA ANNUAL MEETING NOVEMBER 4th - 6th, 2022

The Society for the Study of Egyptian Antiquities/Société pour l'Étude de l'Égypte Ancienne is now inviting proposals for "Virtual Poster" contributions for its Annual Meeting, to be held NOVEMBER 4th - 6th, 2022 at Toronto, Canada.

Similar to last year, we are seeking "virtual poster" proposals for a Poster Session. Proposals will be accepted from organizations, projects, expeditions, graduate students and senior scholars in the fields of Egyptology, Anthropology, Classics, Fine Arts/Art History, Archaeology, Nubian Studies, ancient Coptic Studies and related fields. They must represent an original contribution to the field. Proposals will be posters re-imagined as a series of slides for Zoom, with an introductory slide and a final slide for footnotes, references and acknowledgements/thanks, to total no more than 10 slides. Either narration or music are suitable as accompaniment. Posters may address any aspect of ANY topic connected with pre-dynastic, pharaonic, Hellenistic, Roman or Coptic Egypt. However, poster presentation is best suited to material with a strong visual impact, rather than a great reliance on text. Posters may be in either English or French. (Ideally, posters will be available in a bilingual version.)

Poster abstracts will be published in the conference abstracts booklet. Poster slides may be uploaded in PDF form to the SSEA/SÉEA website. There will also be a limited number of virtual poster positions available for notices of scholarly projects or organizations in Egyptology, Nubian Studies, Coptic Studies, Near Eastern Studies or Ancient Mediterranean Studies.

Since a limited number of proposals will be accepted, virtual posters will be vetted by committee. Interested scholars should send a title and brief abstract of their proposed poster to the Scholars' Colloquium Coordinators at scholarscolloquium@thessea.org or scholarscoll@thessea.org. Please note that only proposals submitted in electronic format [i.e. via email] will be considered. Proposals must not exceed 350 words in length.

Dans la mesure où les présentations se tiendront en ligne cette année, nous souhaitons recevoir des propositions d'affiche virtuelle pour la séance de présentation par affiches. Les propositions peuvent être soumises par des représentants d'organisation, de projet, de mission, des étudiants de cycles supérieurs ou encore des chercheurs dans le domaine de l'égyptologie, de l'anthropologie, des études classiques, de l'histoire de l'art, de l'archéologie, des études nubiennes, des études coptes et de domaines reliés. Les propositions seront des affiches repensées, présentées en une série de diapositives sur Zoom, incluant une diapositive d'introduction et de conclusion comprenant les notes, les références et les remerciements, la présentation devant se limiter à 10 diapositives. Il est également possible d'ajouter une trame sonore ou une narration. Le thème de la présentation par affiche peut concerner tout sujet en lien avec l'Égypte prédynastique, pharaonique, hellénistique, romaine ou encore copte. Néanmoins, ce type de présentation convient mieux aux sujets qui se fondent sur un important contenu visuel plutôt que textuel. Les affiches peuvent être présentées en anglais ou en français (et, dans l'idéal, en version bilingue).

Les résumés des affiches seront publiés dans le programme du colloque. Les diapositives des affiches pourront être téléchargées en format PDF sur le site national de la SEEA/SÉÉA. The 2022 Sally L. D. Katary Scholarship Fundraising Lecture


Prof. Jean Li of Toronto Metropolitan University (formerly Ryerson) gave this year's Sally L.D. Katary Scholarship fundraising lecture on May 28. Her talk, "Women's Work: Public and Private Power in Ancient Egypt", attracted 100 registrations and raised \$500 for the scholarship.

Prof. Li looked at the role of women in ancient Egypt from the perspectives of their influence in "public" - participation in governmental and professional institutional systems – as opposed to "private" – less formal – spheres of life. Her talk pointed out the the ambiguities and inconsistencies of their role.

While it is true that women had legal standing, and could acquire and dispose of their own property, women appeared to have limited visibility in the public governmental spheres. After discussing a number of instances where women clearly did hold significant positions in religion and in the ruling structure, she went on to consider evidence for their less direct influence, which came from such positions as wetnurse, mother of the king, and the even less formal "wise woman", who often wielded great influence locally.

A number of questions were raised following the lecture, leading to interesting additional exchanges.
